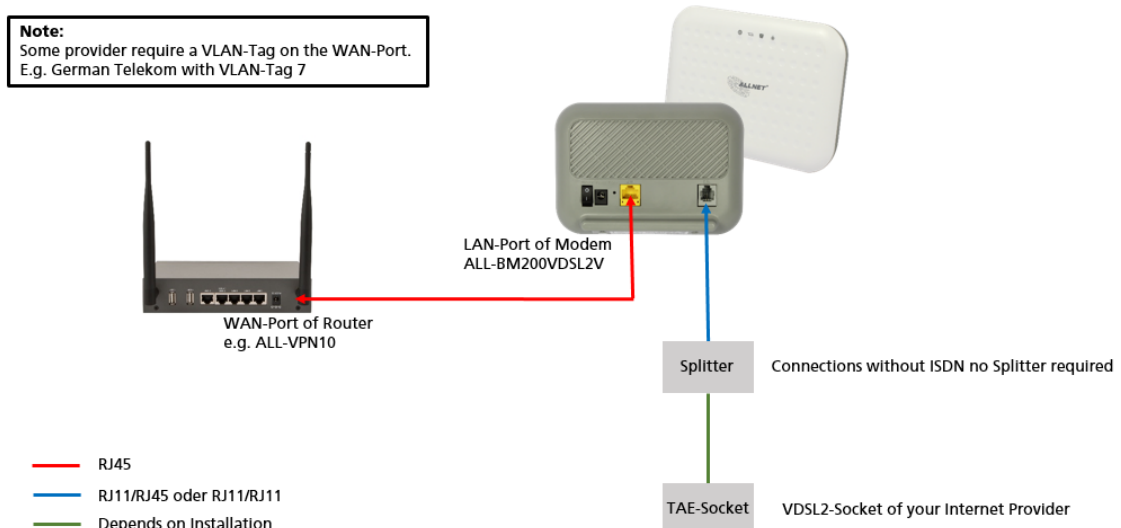

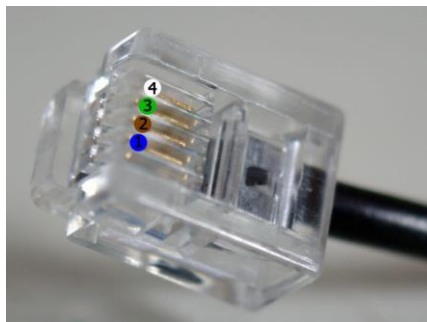

## Pin assignment:

Please use PIN 2 and 3 for the DSL cable signal at the RJ11 connector.



# LED indicators

LED	Color	Function
	Green	On: Power on Off: No power
	Green	On: LAN link established and active via LAN port Blinking: DSL data activity occurs Off: No LAN link via LAN port
	Green	On: DSL link established and active Quick blinking: DSL is trying to establish a connection Slow blinking: No DSL link
	Green	On: IP connected Blinking: IP connected and IP traffic is passing through the device Off: Modem power off or DSL connection not present

## Reset to Factory Defaults

Should you forget your login data or the IP address of your ALL-BM200VDSL2V, you can reset your device to factory defaults. For that, press the Reset-Button on the back of the device for about 5 seconds. Subsequently all of the devices LEDs will go out for a short period of time (except the PWR-LED). The device will reboot with the factory defaults loaded.
